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
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



June 25, 1901—June 6, 1929



DEBATING TEAM

Forensics

DURING the past year the Chicago-Kent College of Law retained its enviable position in the foreground of intercollegiate debating.

Early in the school year, the students were given the opportunity of displaying their individual talents in the field of forensic art. The occasion being the annual tryouts in the respective classes to determine the winners of the Edmund W. Burke Memorial prizes given to the students of the college who excel in oratory and debating. The contests were held under the very able supervision of Coach William James. The students responded very enthusiastically to his call, competition was keen, and as a result the oratory was filled with eloquence and logic, and the speeches were of an exceptional high caliber.

The successful contestants in the Senior debating contest were: E. Douglas Schwantes, Charles H. Edwards, and David A. Skalitzy. The awards in the Junior contest went to P. Warren McCaffery, Vernon Sigler, and Francis E. Cash. The winners of the Freshman contest were: Robert N. Bishop, Horace G. Marshall, and Richard G. Finn.

Immediately following these successful tryouts, were held the round robin series of debates to determine the class champions of the college.

The first interclass debate was held between the teams of the Freshman and Junior classes on the evening of November 2nd. The subject argued pro and con with excellent thought and debating ability was: "Resolved: That national advertising, as now carried on, is socially and economically harmful." The Freshmen successfully upheld the negative side of the question.

Encouraged by their victory, the Freshmen now had high ambitions, and earnestly prepared to meet the noble Seniors. On Friday evening, December 14th, these rivals debated a subject well chosen for law students, namely, Resolved: "That trial by jury should be abolished in the United States." The debate attracted a large audience, everyone of whom thoroughly enjoyed this bitter struggle for the team debating and oratorical supremacy of the College. The Freshmen upholding the negative were militant to the end, but they could not quite match the eloquence and cogent argument of the more experienced Seniors. As a result the Senior class team emerged victorious and were declared the class Champions of the College. Those who represented the victors, who this year are class champions, were E. Douglas Schwantes, David A. Skalitzy, and Charles H. Edwards.

Coach William James now spent his efforts and time preparing his debators for the series of intercollegiate radio debates, over WMAQ that were soon to follow.

On January 13th, Chicago-Kent College of Law went on the air, for the first time this year, against Coe College. J. Warren McCaffery and Francis E. Cash very ably advocated the negative of the question: "Resolved, "That further extension of installment buying would be economically unsound." The result of the contest was determined by popular vote, the radio audience mailing in their votes. Coe College received a slight majority.

Washington and Lee University sent a strong team to our city on February 10th to debate the following subject: "Resolved, That Congress should enact uniform marriage and divorce laws for all states, constitutionality waived." The Chicago-Kent College was very well represented by Charles H. Edwards, Richard G. Finn, and Robert N. Bishop, who upheld the negative side of the question, but unfortunately the majority of the radio audience refused to be moved by their splendid efforts.

The colors of Chicago-Kent College were carried to a decisive victory on March 10th. The debating team of the University of Florida came up from the South to engage our team on the following subject, "Resolved, That the system of trial by jury should be abolished in the United States." So successfully did David A. Skalitzky, Horace G. Marshall, and E. Douglas Schwantes propound the negative that one member of the radio audience from Iowa mailed in the following letter: "I have noted carefully—grasp of the question, accuracy of analysis, selection of evidence, order and cogency of arguments; likewise, earnestness of voice, emphasis and enunciation. I cast my vote for the team representing the Chicago-Kent College of Law." This debate drew the largest popular vote of the season.


Our series of radio debates was brought to a most successful close on April 7th when Robert N. Bishop and Vernon Sigler met and defeated the team from the College of St. Thomas who last year won the National Collegiate Debating Championship. The team from Chicago-Kent College argued with commending ability and success the negative of the following subject: "Resolved, That the public should retain ownership of and develop the principal sources of hydro-electric power in the United States."

To Coach William James belongs the credit and honor of entrenching the debating teams of the Chicago-Kent College of Law in a position of very high repute in the field of intercollegiate forensics. The debaters are greatly indebted to him for the unstinted efforts he has extended in their behalf. With much patience and skill he has developed voices that someday may resound in the halls of Congress.
