Seniors: Illinois Bar Exam Registration Update

Students who began law school prior to 1993 only have to file a bar exam application to take the Illinois bar exam and should not read the rest of this notice.

Students who began law school after 1992 must file two documents to take the Illinois bar exam. (1) An Application to Register as a Candidate for Admission to the Practice of Law (a "Registration Application"). This should be filed by March 1 of the first year of law school, but may be filed after that date by paying an additional fee of \$250. (2) A Final Application for the Bar Examination which is filed during the last semester of school.

The Illinois Board of Admissions just advised me that if you did not file the Registration Application by March 1 of your first year of law school, the best time to file it is with your Final Application in your last semester. If you file the Registration Application before the Final Application, you will also have to file a character and fitness update form. If you file the two applications together, the update is not required. Bottom line: if you did not file the Registration Application in your first year, send it in the same envelope as your Final Application.

The February, 1996 bar candidates are the first group for whom a Registration Statement is required and the Board of Admissions does not have all of their procedures set yet. This information is current as of October 5; I'll notify you if there is a change. If you have any questions, contact me or call the Illinois Board of Admissions directly at 217-522-5917.

Computer Exam Sign-up

Students who want to use a computer for their final exam should sign up in the Registrar's office beginning Thursday, October 12. The Registrar's office will post a list of instructors who permit the use of computers for their final exam on the second floor bulletin board. The deadline to sign up is Thursday, October 26.

If there are not enough computers to accommodate all students, some instructors will not permit any of their students to use computers while others permit a lottery drawing to select eligible students. The order in which you sign up is not relevant to whether or not you will be accommodated. The names of all students, if any, who cannot be accommodated will be posted on Monday, October 30.

First Year Students - Undergraduate Transcripts

Registration for the spring semester will take place in November. You will not be permitted to register for the spring semester unless a final official transcript from your undergraduate school is in your law school file. If we don't have your final transcript yet, please contact your undergraduate school and request that an official transcript be mailed directly to the law school Registrar's office.

Change of Division

If you want to change divisions for the spring semester, you must submit a Request to Change Divisions to the Registrar's office by Friday, October 13, 1995. If there is space available, all students will be accommodated. Otherwise, a drawing will be held to select the students who may change divisions. Students who change divisions will have the lowest registration priority within their starting date group for the Spring, 1996 registration. First-year evening students who change to the Day Division will have to take several required courses in the evening during the next two semesters.

All students who are interested in externing for a federal appellate, federal district, bankruptcy or federal magistrate judge for the Spring 1996 Semester should apply immediately.

A judicial externship enables the student to become involved in particular legal problems through research and writing, and to contribute in the resolution of those legal problems. Depending upon the judge, an extern may have the opportunity to observe the day-to-day routine of a judge and discuss with the judge and the judge's law clerk those legal problems which attorneys face in their profession, and the specific problems which attorneys confront in the courtroom. FACULTY NEWS

Professor David Gerber taught last year on the law faculty of the University of Munich (Germany), where he was the first holder of a professorial chair created for foreign scholars. In January he gave a talk entitled "European Union Law: Thinking About It and Teaching It" at the Association of American Law Schools Convention in New Orleans. In April, he gave a talk entitled "Competition Law and the Consumer in Europe: A Clouded Relationship" at a symposium on law and the consumer at the University of Rome.

Advanced Externship Program Spring, 1995

THIRD YEAR STUDENTS ONLY:

Do you wish to develop your legal skills? Gain practical legal experience in a specialized area of law with a corporation, firm or government agency? Make yourself more marketable to prospective employers upon graduation? If you have answered "yes" to any of the above questions, consider applying for the Advanced Externship Program for Spring Semester 1995.

The Advanced Externship Program is a **four credit hour program** consisting of a 3 credit hour fieldwork and a 1 credit hour classroom component. The program is open to students in their last two semesters of law school. For the fieldwork component, an extern is placed in a private or public, civil or criminal practice and is required to work a minimum of 15 hours a week at his/her designated placement. Externs interested in civil law may select to work under the supervision of general counsel in major corporations or under the supervision of designated teaching lawyers in well-known firms or specific government agencies. Externs may specialize in such diverse legal areas as tax, commodities, securities, corporate, health care, medical malpractice, and general corporate law, etc. Those interested in criminal law may select to work with designated supervising lawyers at the States Attorney's Office, Public Defender's or the U.S. Attorney's office. Many externships may offer the externs opportunities to obtain a 711 license and appear in court.

The accompanying classroom component consists of a 1 hour class weekly, which focuses on various aspects of today's practice of law and on the externs' fieldwork experiences.

If you are interested in learning more about externship opportunities or in applying for the program, please see Professor Vivien Gross in Room 617.

More information about the program and an accompanying application form are available in the Law Offices Reception Area. Applications must be turned in to Room 612 by 5:00 p.m. on **Wednesday, November 1**. **All applicants must have scheduled and completed an interview with Professor Gross prior to turning in their applications.** Slots are limited. In the event applicants outnumber the number of students that can be accepted in the program, students with at least one semester of Law Offices or LADR (Law Alternative Disputes Resolution program) will receive a preference over other students in being admitted in the Externship Program.

PET THEFT - CONGRESS HEARS TESTIMONY: Each year an estimated 1.5 million dogs and cats are stolen from households across America and sold to dealers who supply animals for laboratory research and testing. Judith Reitman, journalist and author of the expose' on pet theft entitled *Stolen For Profit*, testified before the House Appropriations Subcommittee on Agriculture. Ms. Reitman presented testimony that documented the USDA's complicity with the animal dealers and research facilities that they are suppose to be regulating. She provided evidence, including internal memos from the USDA, showing that the agency is diverting millions of dollars allotted for enforcement of anti-pet theft laws to instead disregard federal law and collude with the biomedical industry.

Ms. Reitman testified that, "Stolen for Profit ... focused national attention on the role of the USDA and a segment of the biomedical industry in delivering pets to laboratories. Pet theft is not about animal rights. It is not about the efficacy of animal research. Pet theft is about the government's utter failure to protect its citizens from felony crime. And the fact is that passport into this criminal activity is a license issued by the USDA."
